Cleaning Highlights

Accomplishments

Plaza Pressure Washing

Ambassadors pressure washed the city plaza in preparation for the Taste of Chico event.

Garbage Cans Cleaned

Ambassadors cleaned more garbage cans this month than any previous month.

Field Observations

Homeless Activity Triage

The first three hours of every morning are being spent cleaning up spills from homeless activity, such as the waste left behind from torn open garbage bags that have been removed from dumpsters.

At least once per week, Ambassadors filled the municipal trash dumpster completely full before 9 AM strictly due to volume of litter and debris collected.

Other

Tree branches are falling daily, often obstructing public right of ways. Ambassadors have been quick to remove limbs and take them to the city yard.

There are storm drains that require cleaning of litter and debris, however none thus far have backed up in the first rains of fall.

Initiatives

Leaves, Gutters and Storm Drains

Maintaining a clean district will be the top priority for Ambassadors during the month of October with an emphasis on flood prevention.







Safety Highlights

Accomplishments

Voluntary Compliance

Sit-Lie compliancy was at an all time high in September with a rate of ninety one percent.

Observed Panhandling

The counts for aggressive and passive panhandling were the second lowest they've been since the inception of our program.

The Graduate

Ambassadors caught two individuals trespassing, then breaking and entering. Ambassadors contacted Modern Building company and secured a Trespass Authorization form on behalf of the property owner, preventing the individuals from becoming permanent residents, a situation that could have delayed demolition and construction.

Field Observations

Lost Park

The street population continues to hide out just north of the district boundaries, concealed by the terrain, where majority of crime is taking place.

Activity includes littering waterways, overt drug use, graffiti, encampments, vandalism and possession or exchange of stolen property.

Assistance from police and park rangers has been requested on several occasions but no response has been received. Meanwhile, the area continues to deteriorate and it has become pointless for Ambassadors to dedicate resources toward a problem that isn't technically within district boundaries.

Parking Garage

There were a handful of vehicle thefts in September and there hadn't been any since the cameras were installed. Information was provided to Target Team so that they could check cameras and apprehend the individuals. No investigation has been conducted as of yet.

Policing

A memorandum was distributed through the police department regarding the Supreme Court's decision that it is unlawful for officers to arrest homeless people for sleeping and camping while there aren't any beds available in shelters. It seems police are currently arresting only for theft and violent crime. The city declared a shelter crisis on

Homeless Outreach

Trail Cameras

It is currently being considered whether or not that hidden trail cameras may be a worthwhile investment in the near future.

These devices could be used to collect evidence of crime that could then be relayed to the police, if police are willing to prosecute.






